Biographies of Honorees



His Excellency Simon B. Jones-Hendrickson, PhD

r. S. B. Jones-Hendrickson, full Professor of Economics, University of the Virgin Islands, St. Croix campus and DEAN of the College of Liberal Arts & Social Sciences, is an alumnus of the College of the Virgin Islands, now the University of the Virgin Islands (UVI). He graduated with an AA in Business Administration in 1967. In 1969 and 1970, he earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Economics from Illinois State University, Normal, Illinois and in 1976 he earned a Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Exeter, Devon, England.

Professor Jones-Hendrickson was a lecturer in Economics at the University of the West Indies, Mona, Jamaica from 1973-1976. He joined the faculty of the UVI in 1976 as an Assis-

tant Professor of Economics, and in 1990, he attained the rank of full Professor of Economics. He has held a number of administrative positions at UVI, and has gained a number of honors. Outside of his University academic fold, Professor Jones-Hendrickson is very active as an External Examiner in Economics for UWI, as a Moderator in CAPE Economics for CXC, and as a past President and founding Secretary-Treasurer of the Caribbean Studies Association. In the area of consulting, Professor Jones-Hendrickson has been a consultant to the Organization of Eastern Caribbean States, the Regional Program of Monetary Studies, now called the Center for Monetary Studies, the Government of St. Kitts and Nevis and the Government of Montserrat and UNESC, the Eastern Caribbean Institute of Banking. As a writer/scholar, Professor Jones-Hendrickson is very prolific. He has presented and or written over 100 original works in Economics in the area of Public Finance. Among his books are Readings in Caribbean Public Sector Economics (Coeditor, 1981); Public Finance and Monetary Policy in Open Economies. (1985), and Caribbean Visions, (Editor, 1990), Essays on the OECS Economies, (2006), and Essays on the Economy of St. Kitts and Nevis (2011).

His creative works are, the ever popular Sonny Jim of Sandy Point (1991);Death on the Pasture (1994); Andy Browne's Departure (2004), Dana, Steven and Brenda (2009) and A Weekend in Paradise (2010). He has three books of poetry.

Professor Jones-Hendrickson was Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors of St. Kitts and Nevis, 1995-2000, and was a member of the St. Kitts and Nevis Constitutional Task Force. Presently he is a Commissioner on the Public Expenditure Reform Commission of the Eastern Caribbean Currency Union; he was also a Commissioner of the OECS Tax Reform and Administration Commission. Professor Jones-Hendrickson was the AMBASSADOR OF ST. KITTS AND NEVIS to CARICOM, THE OECS and the Association of Caribbean States from 2001-2004.

On August 17, 2000, Professor Jones-Hendrickson was honored by the CARICOM at the CARIFTA Festival in St. Kitts for outstanding contribution in the Arts and Literature. In June 2001, he was honored by the Caribbean Studies Association, in St. Maarten, Netherlands Antilles, for his scholarship and excellence in leader-ship in the Caribbean Studies Association. On March 15, 2002, he was honored by the University of the Virgin Islands for his contributions in the academic arena, and as an alumnus of the College/University of the Virgin Islands. On April 6, 2002, Professor Jones-Hendrickson was also honored as an alumnus of Achievement at Illinois State University for having "received statewide, national, or international recognition for his many works.

Professor Jones-Hendrickson and his wife, Dr. Cora L. E. Christian, are the proud parents of two children, Nesha, an Attorney at Law, and Marcus, a Biologist, with current employment in banking. Professor S. B., as he is affectionately called, is an avid tennis player.

Biographies of Honorees

Joseph J. Halliday, PhD, OBE

Dr. Joseph Halliday has made an outstanding contribution to the education system in the Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis. He has inspired many by his professionalism, integrity, perseverance, loyalty, religious convictions and other leadership qualities. Such is his dedication that he would do anything to assist in uplifting the moral and educational standards of his fellowmen. He has served his country well by teaching, training and nurturing hundreds of students in the Sandy Point High School, and as Chief Education Officer.

Born in Fig Tree, Sandy Point in July 1938, Dr. Halliday is the third child of 8 siblings. From a child, he was always inquisitive and often probed and investigated until he was satisfied that he had either mastered a concept or at least understood the logic. Yet his road to success was not an easy one. While in his

teens, he was afflicted with physical and medical challenges. These trials helped him to develop stamina, tenacity, persistence and patience – qualities which served him well as Headmaster in Sandy Point in the historical and political climate of the 1970's. As principal of the school he was not only the lead teacher, but he was also police, magistrate and judge. He abhorred mediocrity, insisted on academic excellence, encouraged and demanded discipline not only for intellectual performance but in behavior, manners and respect. He emphasized that excellence was *not* an accident but the result of high intention, and dedication.

In 1975, Dr. Halliday was promoted to Chief Educator and served in that capacity for 20 years. Though he was firmly grounded in traditional educational methods, he was never reluctant to introduce modern concepts, techniques or technologies that would enhance the teaching-learning environment. He was responsible for launching the Southern Regional Board's CSE examination for school leavers in the all age schools.

In 1996, Dr. Halliday carried the same level of commitment to the office of Personnel Officer of the Royal St. Kitts and Nevis Police Force, which at that time was going through a turbulent and challenging period. The five-year strategic plan that he initiated was implemented to increase efficiency, improve morale, image, accountability, and to address the many complex issues in the force. Under his initiatives, the University of the West Indies introduced the Diploma in Security Administration for Senior Police Officers in its curriculum. This was the first island in the Eastern Caribbean to host such a program. His expertise has benefited projects and programs associated with UNICEF, the OAS, the OECS and UWI.

His numerous published and unpublished books, articles and professional papers illustrate his wide interests. As an astute academician his thirst for knowledge never diminished and he committed himself to continued improvement, which resulted in the attainment of his Masters Degree from University of London then PhD from the University of the West Indies, Jamaica. To top it all, Dr. Halliday's long career was crowned with the distinguished OBE (Order of the British Empire) award in 2000.

Dr. Halliday is the husband of Maisie Halliday, the father of five children and the grandfather of four grand children. He is a committed Christian whose admirable characteristics, unwavering faith, honesty and sincerity enabled him to be forthright in dealing with others while his discretion, restraint and tolerance governed his responses to delicate situations.

The Federation of St. Kitts and Nevis is much better off as a result of the expertise and guidance provided by Dr. Joseph Jacob Halliday.

He is without doubt a wonderful role model for men and women in all spheres of life.

Biographies of Honorees

Hannah E. Guishard, DVM

Dr. Hannah Eloise Guishard is the second child born to the late Ridley Guishard and Maria Guishard in October 1967. A British Islander Virgin by birth, but Sandy Point is the place that she knows as home. When she graduated from the Sandy Point High School in 1986, Han-



nah returned to her birth place where she gained employment as an Accounts Clerk with Road Town Whole Sale on the island of Tortola.

At 19 years of age Hannah journeyed to Alabama A&M University to begin her studies in pre- veterinary medicine. Seven years later she completed her formal training and graduated from Tuskegee University in Alabama with a Doctor of Veterinary Medicine Degree. For 5 years the young Dr. Guishard worked with various private veterinary medical corporations.

During her term of employment with these establishments, Dr. Guishard had an epiphany that propelled her into the arena of entrepreneurship. She recognized that within her lies the power to create and the power to develop into the person that she would become. She tapped into the greatness and the strength that resided in her began the work of establishing her own veterinary clinic.

By January 1999, true to the meaning of the word 'epiphany', Dr. Guishard had her business plan created. After a near grueling two years of developing and implementing those plans, **Union City Veterinary Medical Center and Emergency Clinic**, the brainchild of Hannah Eloise Guishard had become a reality. From its first day of operation on December 5, 2000, this Veterinary Medical facility has stood as a beacon in the Union City Community. Currently, Dr. Guishard manages a staff of 22 medical personnel – 5 doctors and 17 paraprofessionals. A young woman of humble beginnings from Sandy Point, St. Kitts, who built her

business from the ground up, is the Founder and CEO of a very flourishing veterinary medical practice in the State of Georgia. Beyond the shadow of a doubt, Dr. Guishard's accomplishment is worthy of emulation.

As a contributor to SPBS, Dr. Guishard gives back to the community that nurtured her, as well as to the community that she now calls home. Her dream is to one day provide an all expense paid, *Ridley Guishard Memorial Scholarship* that will allow an under privileged child from the Sandy Point Community to pursue undergraduate studies at an American university. She is not only a mentor to high school students whom she employs at her clinic, but to students pursuing undergraduate degrees in Veterinary medicine at her alma mater, at Morehouse College, and at Harvard University.

Dr. Guishard volunteers and speaks at both elementary and secondary schools in the Metro Atlanta Area. She is the very proud mother of two sons, Immanuel and Etienne. Truly, Hannah is destined for even more greatness, and it is by design!

UNDERSTANDING PROSTATE CANCER

In 2010, the death rate per 100,000 of the population for Prostate cancer in St Kitts was 31.36, with a world ranking of number 2. (Latest WHO data). Men have to visit their physician and be screened for early detection and better cure rate because of early detection.

Normal Anatomy

The normal prostate is a small, squishy gland about the size of a walnut. It sits under the bladder and in front of the rectum. The urethra - the narrow tube that runs the length of the penis and carries both urine and semen out of the body - runs directly through the prostate. The rectum, or lower end of the bowel, sits just behind the prostate and the bladder.




Fig. 1: Male Anatomy of Reproduction: The Prostate

Normal Physiology

The prostate is not essential for life, but it's important for reproduction. It supplies substances that facilitate fertilization and sperm transit and survival. Prostate Specific Antigen (PSA) is an enzyme produced by the prostate and it loosens up semen to help sperm reach the egg during intercourse. Other substances made by the seminal vesicles and prostate - such as zinc, citrate, and fructose - give sperm energy to make this journey. The prostate typically grows during adolescence under the control of the male hormone testosterone and its byproduct dihydrotestosterone.

Risk Factors




Fig. 2: Pareto Chart of Male New Cancer Risk by Location

Prostate cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer affecting older men and second-biggest cancer killer. Prostate cancer is the most common non-skin

cancer in America, affecting 1 in 6 men. See Fig. 2 below. There are several major factors that influence the risk, some of them unfortunately cannot be changed.

Age: The older you are, the more likely you are to be diagnosed with prostate cancer. 1 in 10,000 men under age 40 will be diagnosed, 1 in 38 for ages 40 to 59, and 1 in 15 for ages 60 to 69. In fact, more than 65% of all prostate cancers are diagnosed in men over the age of 65. The average age at diagnosis of prostate cancer in the United States is 69 years. After that age, the chance of developing prostate cancer becomes more common than any other cancer in men or women.

Race: African-American men are 60% more likely to develop prostate cancer compared with Caucasian men and are nearly 2.5 times as likely to die from the disease. Conversely, Asian men who live in Asia have the lowest risk. **Family history/genetics:** A man with a father or brother who developed prostate cancer is twice as likely to develop the disease. This risk is further increased if the cancer was diagnosed in family members at a younger age (less than 55 years of age) or if it affected three or more family members.

Where you live: For men in the U.S., the risk of developing prostate cancer is 17%. For men who live in rural China, it's 2%. However, when Chinese men move to the western culture, their risk increases substantially. Men who live in cities north of 40 degrees latitude (north of Philadelphia, PA, Columbus, OH, and Provo, UT, for instance) have the highest risk for dying from prostate cancer of any men in the United States. This effect appears to

be mediated by inadequate sunlight during three months other unknown factors. of the year, which reduces vitamin D levels.




Fig. 3: The Cretan Mediterranean style diet

Diet: Evidence relating diet and prostate cancer was recently reviewed, suggesting that a traditional Cretan Mediterranean style diet based on a variety of plant foods (fruits, vegetables, wholegrain cereals, nuts and legumes), olive oil as the main source of fat, low intake of red meat, moderate to low intake of dairy foods, moderate to high intake of fish and moderate intake of wine, mostly consumed with meals, may be helpful in reducing prostate cancer risk. Importantly, the Mediterranean diet Not everyone experiences symptoms of prostate cancer. has other health benefits that further support its widespread adoption. A recent meta-analysis of prospective cohort studies using a priori score to assess adherence to a Mediterranean diet (Fig. 3 below) found that stronger adherence was associated with reduced all cause, cardiovascular and cancer mortality, as well as decreased incidence of Parkinson's and Alzheimer's diseases.

Myths and Non-Risks

Sexual Activity: High levels of sexual activity or frequent ejaculation have been rumored to increase prostate cancer risk. This is untrue. In fact, studies show that men who reported more frequent ejaculations had a lower risk of developing prostate cancer. Having a vasectomy was originally thought to increase a man's risk, but this has since been disproven.

Medications - Several recent studies have shown a link between aspirin intake and a reduced risk of prostate

cancer by 10-15%. This may result from different screening practices, through a reduction of inflammation, or

- Statins. Commonly used to lower cholesterol has also recently been linked to a reduced risk of aggressive prostate cancer in some studies.
- S Alcohol There is no link between alcohol and prostate cancer risk.
- **OVITAMINE** Recent studies have not shown a benefit to the consumption of vitamin E or selenium in the prevention of prostate cancer.

Symptoms

Many times, signs of prostate cancer are first detected by a doctor during a routine check-up. Some men, however, will experience changes in urinary or sexual function that might indicate the presence of prostate cancer. These symptoms may include:

- A need to urinate frequently, especially at night
- Difficulty starting urination or holding back urine
- Weak or interrupted flow of urine
- Painful or burning urination
- Difficulty in having an erection
- Painful ejaculation
- Blood in urine or semen
- Service Frequent pain or stiffness in the lower back, hips, or upper thighs

You should consult with your doctor if you experience any one or more of the symptoms above. Some of these symptoms could also be due to Benign Prostate Hypertrophy (BPH) and not Prostate Cancer.

SCREENING

The purpose of screening is to detect prostate cancer at its earliest stages, before any symptoms have developed. Some men do experience symptoms that might indicate the presence of prostate cancer. These symptoms can also indicate the presence of other prostate diseases or disorders such as benign prostate hypertrophy (BPH) or prostatitis, so these men will undergo a more thorough work-up.

Prostate cancer that's detected by screening in the very early-stages can be treated most effectively. Physicians can screen for prostate cancer quickly and easily in their office using two tests: the PSA (prostate-specific antigen) blood test and the digital rectal exam (DRE).

The PSA Blood Test

PSA is a protein produced by the prostate and release in small amounts into the blood stream. When there is a problem with the prostate, like prostate cancer, and BPH, abnormally large amount of PSA is released. This test is not very reliable in black men.

Blood is taken from the patient (male) and sent to the lab 🔻 Seafood: Omega-3 fatty acids, salmon, mackerel, herand the PSA is measured:

- Less than 4 ng/mL is considered "normal"
- Levels greater than 10 ng/mL is considered "high"
- Levels 4 10 are considered "intermediate"

PSA can also be diluted in men who are obese or overweight and a biopsy at a relatively lower number should be considered.

The Digital Rectal Exam (DRE)





Fig. 5: PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) test and DRE (Digital Rectal Examination) are two tests that allow detection of prostate cancer at early stages.

During a DRE, the physician inserts a gloved, lubricated finger into the rectum and examines the prostate for any or radiation seeds are planted in the prostate. irregularities in size, shape or texture. See Fig. 5 above. The test may save your life and it is a quick examination lasting a few seconds.

When to Start and Stop Screening

When to start depends on risk and age. Generally at age 40 is a reasonable time to start for those at highest risk. However, for otherwise healthy mean at high risk eg., family history or African-American men, starting at 40-45 years is reasonable. When to stop is a personal decision which may be discussed with our urologist.

Prevention Tips – Eat smart:

- Fats: Limit fat intake to 15-20% of total calories. Use corn oil or olive oil to cook, soy products, sesame seeds too.
- Fruits and vegetables: Eat 5 or more servings daily.

Broccoli, cauliflower, cabbage, bok choy, kale, brussel sprouts, tomatoes are highly recommended.

- ring. Eat 3 4 serving per week (3 oz per serving)
- Fiber: Whole grains, legumes, nuts, seeds, some fruits and vegetables. Eat 35 grams of fiber daily.

Treatment Options:

There are a number of treatment options that should be discussed with family and your physician. They include (a) active surveillance where you do nothing but observe, (b) Prostatectomy – remove the prostate (c) Chemotherapy and hormone - treat with medication (d) radiation – x-rays

Summary of CXC-CSEC **Performance at CEMSS** From 2007 - 2011.

ver the past five years, (2007 -2011) the Charles E. Mills Secondary School (CEMSS)formerly the Sandy Point High School - has experienced some challenges as well as some successes in CXC- CSEC examinations. Students sat twenty-six subjects during the stipulated period. These subjects are Agricultural Science (double and single award), Biology, Caribbean History, Chemistry, English 'A', English 'B', Food and Nutrition, French, Geography, Home Economics, Integrated Science, Mathematics, Office Procedures, Physics, Principles of Accounts, Principles of Business, Social Studies, Spanish, Technical CCSLC is the acronym for "The Caribbean Certificate of Drawing, Visual Arts, Electronic Document Preparation Management, Human and Social Biology, Wood Work nation came into effect in 2007. and Information Technology. It must be noted however, that Human and Social Biology was introduced in 2008, and the Music exam was introduced in 2009.

The year 2008 showed the lowest average pass rate for grade 4 at CSEC will also qualify for certification. the given period. The average pass rate for that year was 66.8%. One hundred and sixteen students sat exams that year. This represented the most students **2007 Results Highlights:** sitting exams for any given year over the five year period. This further reflects the school's effort to offer more opportunities to students who performed below the accepted standard, to attempt CXC – CSEC exams. Only two (2) subjects got below 50% pass rate. During that year also, three (3) subjects had a 100% pass rate. These were Biology, French and EDPM (Electronic Document Preparation Management). Additionally, a total of 49 distinctions were gained.

In 2010, the school had its highest percentage average pass rate ever. There was a pass rate 88.5% from exams written by (83) students. That year, CEMSS also had the best results in the federation. There were 109 distinctions and 15 subjects gained 100% pass rates. That year, only 4 subjects got a pass rate of less than 85% with the lowest subject pass rate being 60%.

Some subjects distinguished themselves by returning outstanding results over the five year period. The performance in French was guite remarkable as this is the only subject that had a consistent pass rate of 100% for the five year period. Similarly, Food and Nutrition and Office Procedures showed 100% pass rates

for four of the five years. Other notable performances were registered by Agricultural Science (DA), Biology, Geography, Home Economics, Principles of Accounts, Principles of Business and Spanish as these subjects sustained a pass-rate of 80% and above over the period under discussion.

During the years 2009 to 2011, the school's average CXC-CSEC exam pass rate has been above 80 %. The number of distinctions gained each year has also been higher than the previous two years. This could no doubt be attributed to the fact that more students from the fourth form who had not shown the aptitude for writing the CXC – CSEC exams, were encouraged to access

Students are required to do the two compulsory subjects and three others from the other group. A grade 4 at CSEC will also qualify for certification.

Putting it all in Perspective:

In the English speaking Eastern Caribbean, at the secondary education level, the number of students obtaining acceptable grades in 5 or more subjects is less than one quarter of the cohort sitting the exam (and an even small percentage of the age cohort). In the 2009 CSEC exam, only 21% of the candidates sitting the examination achieved acceptable grades in five or more subjects; 52% of them either did not pass any subject or received acceptable grades in one subject only. Attention to quality and performance is the most urgent of the imperatives facing us particularly at secondary level.

In June 2008, there were 1592 subject entries in St. Kitts and Nevis, of which 1105 returned grades of either "Master" or "Competent", resulting in an overall pass rate of 69.4 %. The average pass rates among the government secondary schools were as follows:

- Washington Archibald High School: 86%
- Sandy Point High School: 78%
- Cayon High School: 74%
- Charlestown Secondary School: 71%
- Verchilds High School: 62%
- Basseterre High School: 42%
- Gingerland Secondary School: 27%

Unlocking the Power of Sugar Cane

Of all the English colonies in the Caribbean, St. Kitts was the oldest and wealthiest - with rich volcanic soil and an ideal climate. St. Kitts yielded a fortune in sugar and rum for its wealthy, mostly absentee, British landholders. By around 1775, the time of the American Revolution, 68 sugar plantations existed on St. Kitts, one for every square mile.

For several decades now Europe's beet sugar has undersold Caribbean sugar. Depressed market prices could not offset the production and transportation costs for an island crop. In 2005, due to plummeting profits, the Government closed both the cane fields and sugar factory. Tourism is now the major source of

income for St. Kitts. The "sugar train railway" is now home to the St. Kitts Scenic Railway, a unique tour that takes visitors through many of the



plantation ruins.

But, is this all for "King Sugar?" What can St. Kitts do with sugar cane? What can we learn from Brazil, one of St. Kitts-Nevis' South American partners of late? Read on ...

Global leaders are searching for clean, renewable options to provide energy and reduce petroleum use. Sugarcane has emerged as an important alternative for meeting those needs. This remarkable plant has the potential to lower CO₂ emissions, create jobs, reduce petroleum use and help create a healthier, cleaner planet.

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

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Understanding Breast Cancer

Breast cancer is cancer that forms in the cells of the

breasts. There are numerous types of breast cancer, but cancer that begins in the milk ducts (ductal carcinoma) is the most common type. Breast cancer can occur in both men and women, but it's far more common in women. Breast cancer survival rates have increased and the number of deaths has been declining, thanks to a number of factors such as earlier detection, new treatments and a better understanding of the disease all because



of increased public support and research funding.

According to the latest WHO data published in April 2011 Breast Cancer Deaths in St. Kitts reached 10 or 2.92% of total deaths. The age adjusted Death Rate is 36.07 per 100,000 of population ranks St. Kitts #1 in the world.

Breast cancer facts:

- 1. Breast cancer is the most common cancer among American women.
- 2. One in every eight women in the United States develops breast cancer.
- 3. There are many types of breast cancer that differ in their capability of spreading (metastasize) to other body tissues.
- 4. The causes of breast cancer are not yet fully known although a number of risk factors have been identified.
- 5. There are many different types of breast cancer.
- Breast cancer is diagnosed with physician and selfexamination of the breasts, mammography, ultrasound testing, and biopsy.
- 7. Treatment of breast cancer depends on the type of cancer and its stage (the extent of spread in the body).


According to the American Cancer society:

- Over 200,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer are diagnosed each year.
- Nearly 40,000 women died of breast cancer in 2011.
- There are over 2.5 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.
- A woman should have a baseline mammogram between the 35 and 40 years of age. Between 40 and 50 years of age, mammograms are recommended every other year. After 50 years of age, yearly mammograms are recommended.

Normal Breast Anatomy

Each of your breasts contains 15 to 20 lobes of glandular

tissue, arranged like the petals of a daisy. The lobes are further divided into smaller lobules that produce milk during pregnancy and breast-feeding. Small ducts conduct the milk to a reservoir that lies



just beneath your nipple. Supporting this network is a deeper layer of connective tissue called stroma.

<u>Symptoms</u>

- A breast lump or thickening that feels different from the surrounding tissue
- Bloody discharge from the nipple
- Change in the size or shape of a breast
- Changes to the skin over the breast, such as dimpling
- Inverted nipple
- Peeling, scaling or flaking of the nipple or breast skin
- Redness or pitting of the skin over your breast, like the skin of an orange

Although the majority of breast changes don't turn out to be cancer, make an appointment to see your doctor if you find a lump or other change in your breast. Even if you've just had a mammogram with normal results, it's still important to have your doctor evaluate any changes.

Causes

It's not clear what causes breast cancer. Doctors know that breast cancer occurs when some breast cells begin growing abnormally. These cells divide more rapidly than healthy cells do. The accumulating cells form a tumor that may spread (metastasize) through your breast, to your lymph nodes or to other parts of your body. Breast cancer most often begins with cells in the milkproducing ducts. Doctors call this type of breast cancer invasive ductal carcinoma. Breast cancer may also begin in the milk glands known as lobules (invasive lobular carcinoma) within the breast.

Researchers have identified things that can increase your risk of breast cancer. But it's not clear why some people who have no risk factors develop cancer, yet other people with risk factors never do.

It's likely that breast cancer is caused by a complex interaction of your genetic makeup and your environment.

Inherited Breast Cancer

It is estimated that only 5 to 10 percent of breast cancers are linked to gene mutations passed through generations (Continued on page 31)

of a family. A number of inherited defective genes that can increase the likelihood of breast cancer have been identified. The most common are breast cancer gene 1 (*BRCA1*) and breast cancer gene 2 (*BRCA2*), both of which increase the risk of both breast and ovarian cancer. If you have a strong family history of breast cancer or other cancers, blood tests may help identify defective BRCA or other genes that are being passed through your family. Consider asking your doctor for a referral to a genetic counselor, who can review your family health history. A genetic counselor can also discuss the benefits, risks and limitations of genetic testing with you. It's important to remember that the genetic tests help to identify a highrisk individual or family, but they don't definitively predict who will or will not get breast cancer.

Risk Factors

A risk factor is anything that makes it more likely you'll get a particular disease. But having one or even several risk factors doesn't necessarily mean you'll develop cancer many women who develop breast cancer have no known risk factors other than simply being women.

Factors that are associated with an increased risk of breast cancer include:

- **Being female.** Women are much more likely than men are to develop breast cancer.
- Increasing age. Your risk of breast cancer increases as you age. Women older than 55 have a greater risk than do younger women.
- A personal history of breast cancer. If you've had breast cancer in one breast, you have an increased risk of developing cancer in the other breast.
- A family history of breast cancer. If you have a mother, sister or daughter with breast cancer, you have a greater chance of being diagnosed with breast cancer. Still, the majority of people diagnosed with breast cancer have no family history of the disease.
- Inherited genes that increase cancer risk. Certain gene mutations that increase the risk of breast cancer can be passed from parents to children. The most common gene mutations are referred to as BRCA1 and BRCA2. These genes can greatly increase your risk of breast cancer and other cancers, but they don't make cancer inevitable.
- Radiation exposure. If you received radiation treatments to your chest as a child or young adult, you're more likely to develop breast cancer later in life.
- Obesity. Being overweight or obese increases your risk of breast cancer because fat tissue produces estrogen that may help fuel certain cancers.

- **Beginning your period at a younger age.** Beginning your period before age 12 increases your risk of breast cancer.
- Beginning menopause at an older age. If you began menopause after age 55, you're more likely to develop breast cancer.
- Having your first child at an older age. Women who give birth to their first child after age 35 may have an increased risk of breast cancer.
- Postmenopausal hormone therapy. Women who take hormone therapy medications that combine estrogen and progesterone to treat the signs and symptoms of menopause have an increased risk of breast cancer.
- Dietary factors such as high-fat diets and alcohol consumption have also been implicated as factors that increase the risk for breast cancer. Experts recommend no more than one alcoholic beverage a day for women.

<u>Myths</u>:

Other risk factors that have been suggested, but **don't play any role in the development of breast cancer** include:

- Tight fitting bras
- Antiperspirants
- Breast implants
- Shift work.

Diagnosing breast cancer: Tests and procedures used to diagnose breast cancer include:

Breast exam. Your doctor will check both of your breasts, feeling for any lumps or other abnormalities. Your doctor will likely check your breasts in varying positions, such as with your arms above your head and at your side. Once you or your doctor can feel a lump and it is proven to be cancerous, your cancer would be more advance that if it could only be detected by mammogram.

Mammogram. A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast. Mammograms are commonly used to screen for breast cancer. If an abnormality is detected on a screening mammogram, your doctor may recommend a diagnostic mammogram to further evaluate that abnormality.

Breast ultrasound. Ultrasound uses sound waves to produce images of structures deep within the body. Your doctor may recommend an ultrasound to help determine whether a breast abnormality is likely to be a fluid-filled cyst or a solid mass, which may be either benign or cancerous. Breast ultrasound is helpful to guide radiologic biopsy to get a sample of breast tissue if a solid mass is found.


Removing a sample of breast cells for testing (biopsy). A biopsy to remove a sample of the suspicious breast cells helps determine whether cells are cancerous. The sample is sent to a laboratory for testing. A biopsy sample is also analyzed to determine the type of cells involved in the breast cancer, the aggressiveness (grade) of the cancer and whether the cancer cells have hormone receptors.

Breast magnetic resonance imaging (MRI). An MRI machine uses a magnet and radio waves to create pictures of the interior of your breast. Before a breast MRI, you receive an injection of dye. This test may be ordered after a breast biopsy confirms cancer, but before surgery to give your doctor an idea of the extent of the cancer and to see if there's any evidence of cancer in the other breast.

Other tests and procedures may be used depending on your situation.

Staging breast cancer

Once your doctor has diagnosed your breast cancer, he or she works to establish the extent (stage) of your cancer. Your cancer's stage helps determine your prognosis and the best treatment options. Complete information about your cancer's stage may not be available until after you undergo breast cancer surgery.



Tests and procedures used to stage breast cancer may include:

- Blood tests, such as a complete blood count
- Mammogram of the other breast
- Chest X-ray
- Breast MRI
- Bone scan
- Computerized tomography (CT) scan
- Positron emission tomography (PET) scan

Not all women will need all of these tests and procedures. Your doctor selects the appropriate tests based on your specific circumstances. Breast cancer stages range from 0 to IV, with 0 indicating cancer that is very small and noninvasive. Stage IV breast cancer, also called metastatic breast cancer, indicates cancer that has spread to other

areas of the body.





Treatment

Your doctor determines your breast cancer treatment options based on your type of breast cancer, its stage, whether the cancer cells are sensitive to hormones, your overall health and your own preferences. Most women undergo surgery for breast cancer and also receive additional treatment, such as chemotherapy, hormone therapy or radiation.

There are many options for breast cancer treatment, and you may feel overwhelmed as you make complex decisions about your treatment. Consider seeking a second opinion from a breast specialist in a breast center or clinic. Talk to other women who have faced the same decision.

Early Detection

It is imperative to note that early detection is paramount to a better cure rate. Mammography of the breast has the ability to detect a cancer in the breast when it is quite small, long before it may be felt by breast examination. Approximately 85%-90% of all breast cancers are detectable by mammography. Early detection by mammography has reduced the <u>mortality rate</u> from breast cancer by 20%-30% in women over 50 years of age.

However, some 10%-15% of breast cancers are not visible on mammography but can be felt on physical examination (Continued on page 33)

of the breast. Therefore, a normal <u>mammogram</u> does not exclude the possibility of breast cancer.

Breast examination by your health care professional by palpation and visual inspection is also important. During a routine physical checkup, a doctor can conduct an examination of the breast. You too should also learn how to perform a self breast examination, so that you can do your own breast examination daily or weekly especially after your shower.

The <u>American Cancer Society</u> (ACS) recommends a <u>base-line</u> mammogram for all women by age 40 and annual mammograms for **women 40 and older for as long as they are in good health.**

In women with "lumpy breasts" or breast symptoms, and also in women with a high risk of developing breast cancer, sometimes a baseline mammogram at 35 years of age is recommended. This recommendation is somewhat controversial, and there are other viewpoints. However, the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) issued new breast cancer screening guidelines in 2009, which recommend against routine mammography screening for women before 50 years of age and suggests that screening end at 74 years of age.

The new USPSTF recommendations are in opposition to other existing breast cancer screening guidelines from organizations such as the American Cancer Society as described above. The USPSTF guidelines also recommend changing the screening interval from one year to two years and suggest that women 40 to 49 years old who are at high risk for breast cancer consult with their doctor regarding the time to begin regular screening mammography.

It is important for women who are concerned about when to begin mammography to discuss the situation with their health care professional. He or she can help you make an informed decision about breast cancer screening that is appropriate for your individual situation.

Diet and lifestyle measures to reduce breast cancer risk. Theoretically, there are dietary and lifestyle measures that can decrease free-radical formation and reduce the risk of

developing breast and other types of cancer. These measures include:

- Diets rich in vegetables and fruits;
- <u>Diets</u> low in fats, and red and overcooked meats;
- Reasonable intake of antioxidants, <u>vitamins</u> E & C;
- Regular <u>exercise</u> and weight reduction;
- Avoiding <u>cigarettes</u>.

The Fruit That Works Like Viagra Michelle Schoffro Cook July 13, 2012

Here's a stimulating study: researchers at Texas A&M University found that **watermelon** may have similar effects as Viagra. The scientists credit a variety of ingredients



that collectively stimulate blood vessels and may increase libido.

Watermelon contains a variety of nutrients like beta carotene and phytonutrients like lycopene (which research incidentally also links to a healthy prostate) and citrulline. Lesser-known citrulline is still being studied to determine its health effects but researchers find that it relaxes blood vessels in the same way Viagra does.

Says Dr. Bhimu Patil, director of Texas A&M's Fruit and Vegetable Improvement Center in College Station: "Arginine boosts nitric oxide, which relaxes blood vessels, the same basic effect that Viagra has, to treat erectile dysfunction and maybe even prevent it."

When citrulline is consumed, it is converted to arginine in the body. Arginine is an amino acid that is well known for its beneficial heart, circulation, and immune system effects. It is also beneficial for obesity and type 2 diabetes. Dr. Patil adds: "Watermelon may not be as organ specific as Viagra but it's a great way to relax blood vessels without any drug side-effects."

In Memory of Pr. Bertram Hudson Ross

His contributions to the SPHS, its students, and the Sandy Point Community is without question.

I first met Bertram Hudson Ross when I went into the second form of the Sandy Point High School. He had just started teaching at the school and was our science teacher. He taught us Integrated Science, O Level Biology and Chemistry. Mr. Ross (Bertram, as I later came to know him) had a style of teaching that made one interested in the subject matter, and do the best that you could. I think I can safely say that Mr. Ross was responsible for



making many of his students having an interest in Science. Mr. Ross was a serious, professional and dedicated educator but also had a great sense of humor. We can remember when he brought a whistle into the classroom, and would blow you "offside" if you weren't paying attention.

Mr. Ross was a role model to his students. He was easily the most influential educator in my years of school and college and his principles still remain with me up until this day. sports house at that time. I also remember his friendly rivalry with his colleague Seymour "Tally" Davis who was the leader of Green House. They created an environment that raised the athletic standard to a higher level, and I give them credit for the contribution they made to Track and Field at SPHS.

He was greatly respected by his students, co-workers and others who came in to contact with him. 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
